How does this year deliver your curriculum intent?

In Year 13, students deepen their sociological understanding through the study of Crime and Deviance, Beliefs, and advanced Theory and Methods. These topics challenge students to make complex connections between individual actions and societal structures, reinforcing their ability to critique explanations of behaviour from multiple perspectives. The curriculum places emphasis on evaluating research and theory, engaging students in debates around social control, inequality, and morality. This cultivates advanced oracy and analytical skills while encouraging learners to question their own assumptions.
